Catalog Description:

One hour lecture, four hours laboratory. Introduction to manual drafting and tools/techniques used by interior designers in executing and reading graphic language in two dimensional form.

Course Objectives:

Welcome to Interior Design! This is your first "studio based course." That means that this course is longer than a typical college course, allowing for work to be done in-class, with the support of the instructor. This is a very unique type of class on a college campus. These types of classes are expensive for the university and require dedication by you and the instructor alike. However, they yield an educational outcome like no other. You will only find these experiences in the College of Architecture, Art and Design. We believe that this level of instructor support is the best way to teach the skills required for professional designers. Getting the most of a studio class depends on your desire to participate. And what you accomplish here depends ultimately on that.

Although we will have time to work in class, studio based classes also require work outside of class. We typically suggest that for every hour in class, you should spend two hours out of class on your assignments, reading, drawing, etc. That means that for this class, you are in studio 6 hours a week, so you should be spending another 12 hours outside of class working on projects for this class. That is a lot of time. Will that happen every week? Maybe, maybe not. But **time management** and work out of class is probably the most critical success factor in any design field in college. If you are not spending time outside of class on studio work, you WILL get behind. Once you get behind, it is VERY hard to catch up.

The main objective of this class is to learn a *new language*, the visual language of design communication. You will be introduced to the tools and equipment required to create this language, and through a series of increasingly complicated exercises and drawings you will begin to understand the communication of construction drawings using residential design as the medium. You will learn this language with two similar methods, by hand drawing and using AutoCAD as the drawing tool. The goal is to reinforce that whichever tool is used, the language is the same.

Topics To Be Covered:

In this class as we combine hand drafting and computer-aided drafting. There are several specific topics we will be covering. We will start with hand drafting because connection to the paper and pencil process has been shown to help students' best grasp the drawing process.

Drafting by Hand

- Understanding Design Drawing Equipment
- Drawing Quality, Symbols, and Lettering
- Drafting Conventions

- Floor Plans, sections, elevations schedules
- Projection Drawings and 2d Presentation Drawing

Student Activities and Assessment:

Activity Notebook #1	Points 150 points (15%)
Notebook #2 Each notebook will consist of drawings using techniques we learn in class. Many of the drawings we will do together as a class. Missing class will require that you learn these techniques from a classmate. It is always desirable to come to the beginning of class as the techniques are demonstrated at the beginning of class.	250 points (25%)
Grading of the notebook will be on craftsmanship, neatness, completeness and following instructions. The exercises in each notebook will become more challenging over the the semester.	
Tests (3) Some of the material we will be covering is information that you need to be able to read and retain. There will be three tests that will cover information from class and your textbook.	200 points (20%)
Reflections (5@20) There will be 5 readings/reflections over the semester. The focus of these readings is the profession of interior design. While we are learning about the visual language of design I also want to introduce you to the profession of design. We will read articles discuss how designers entered the profession, advice for design students, design ethics, and the outlook for the profession.	100 points (10%)
For each reading, you will be given a prompt that you must address in a one page writing assignment. You will submit these to my courses as a .pdf or .doc attachment and should be able to discuss in class. We will discuss in class on the dates marked (The writings will be due online due the nights before at 11:59 pm. Please check my courses so you do not miss these assignments).	
Final Project The final project is an abbreviated set of house plans for a small house. It will be six sheets of 11x17 drawings including elements we have learned throughout the semester. These include: plans, elevations, sections, oblique drawings, rendered floor plans, and schedules. This will be in lieu of a final exam.	300 points (30%)

This course will use MyCourses for information and handouts for homework and assignments. Please check this prior to every class meeting for new assignments. The dates for exams and major projects will not change. It is the student's responsibility to check the syllabus calendar and the My Courses calendar before each class and exam and print out appropriate handouts and bring required materials to class.

Practice outside of class and completion of assignments:

It is the general rule that for **every hour of class time, you should expect to spend up to two hours of time outside of class**. For a course that meets six hours per week, the total weekly practice time is 12 hours. The nature of this subject requires that you practice and show improvement over time. This means coming into the classroom (in addition to class time) to complete assignments.

Some class time will be provided for work on assignments and projects. I will check your progress at each class meeting. You are expected to work on their projects during work sessions so that I can provide guidance. Students who fail to attend work sessions will receive unfavorable consideration if their projects are incomplete or contain errors.

If I do not view work in progress or if all work is completed at another site, it will not be accepted. Such students may be subject to a special proficiency examination.

Course Policies:

Absences: Students will be allowed two unexcused absences from class. This will not be accepted on project due dates or scheduled tests unless prior arrangements have been made with me in advance. Only accepted excuses beyond this are: a death in the immediate family, field trip for another class with prior notification from the instructor, or sickness with a doctor's excuse. All excuses are subject to verification. Three tardies will result in one unexcused absence. Students will be penalized 2 percentage points (from their final grade) for each absence beyond the two unexcused absences for a maximum of 10 percentage points. Coming late or leaving early (more than 10 minutes) from studio classes will result in an unexcused absence.

If you are not present, you are responsible for getting the handouts and assignments from another student. It is your responsibility to make up and the learn material that was covered during your absence.

Pathfinders: The general purpose of Pathfinders is to assist freshmen in becoming personally responsible and self-directed in an environment that is academically more demanding and less regulated than high school. We attempt to achieve this purpose by promoting responsible class attendance. Special emphasis is placed on the first 6 weeks of the freshman year because this is the time most academic problems begin.

Missed Assignments & Test: If you miss an assignment or test, you must contact me prior to the missed class date. Make-up assignment or test will be given only in extreme situations, the veracity of which have been documented and verified
